

**Section A: Relative Clause Reasoning**

1. "The book, which was about dinosaurs, was interesting, so I borrowed it."
2. "Who" is used for people; "which" is used for things or animals
3. e.g. "The book, which I borrowed last week, was excellent."
4. "The house was for sale."
5. They add extra detail in a single sentence, rather than needing a separate sentence for the extra information

Section B: Modal Verbs & Precision

1. Least to most certain: might, could, will
2. e.g. "You must wear a helmet" (essential) vs. "You could wear a helmet" (optional) - "must" leaves no choice, "could" suggests one option among several
3. "Let's go shopping," Mum said.
4. Because "should" suggests a recommendation, while "must" sounds like an order - "should" is gentler for giving advice
5. Any correct sentence using a modal verb like "might" or "could" to express doubt
